Among them were Fruitlands, a vegetarian compound in Massachusetts, where meat eating was strictly prohibited. Then there was Palmanova, in Northern Italy, which relieved prisoners of their sentences and used them to design a utopia where everyone could live in peace together. Equality Colony was formed in Washington State as a socialist utopia where work and rewards were equally shared, also ending in failure in. There were multiple socialist utopias attempted, along with environment friendly utopias, animal friendly utopias, women power utopias, and more. Some of the attempted utopian colonies ended up being hotbeds of molestation and pedophilia, while others, like Jonestown, ended in mass suicide.

The one thing that all these attempted utopias have in common is that they all failed. While men and women throughout history have been trying to make some kind of utopian society on this earth, their attempts have continued to fail miserably and sometimes tragically. Still, utopian fantasies continue to inspire people across the world. The pre-fab house movement has hopes of creating a floating city, while others plan to build future cities in space, but just like the utopias of the past, all these human attempted utopias will fail. The Bible says that the kingdoms of the earth will continue to fail until the God of heaven sets up "a kingdom which shall never be destroyed" (Dan. 2:44).

Because our world is plagued by pain, death, divorce, disease, and all forms of tragedy, mankind longs for something better than this world can offer. That is because God "has put eternity in their hearts" (Eccl. 3:11). In spite of the vain pleasures we find in this life, there is something inside us that longs for more than this world has to offer.
