That is why the Bible says we have all sinned, and all of us are sinners.

The Sentence

Since all have sinned, all deserve to die. At least, this is what the Bible claims. It says, "the

The Great Exchange

While the Bible says, "the wages of sin is death," many think that even if God does exist, He will simply forgive them and let them into heaven because they are basically good. I have often asked people, "If you were standing at the gate of heaven and God was standing in front of you asking, 'Why should I let you into heaven,' what would you say?" The most common response is, "I'm basically good." Most people seem to think that God will let them into heaven on the basis of their good works, not realizing how offensive this is to God. What we don't seem to realize is that our sin killed Jesus. You see, one single sin is like one little malignant cancer cell in the brain. It is deadly, and unless some way is found to remove it, it will kill you. Fortunately, God has offered a way to rescue you. He came to earth to take your sinful mind and die your death so He could give you His sinless mind. That's why the Bible says, "Let this mind be in you

which was also in Christ Jesus" (Phil. 2:5). This is the greatest gift exchange ever!

The Free Gift

Still, as amazing as this offer is, many refuse to take advantage of it. Some feel it is too hard to give up their sins, some are afraid that they will miss their sins, and some feel they are not good enough, but the good news is, salvation is a "free gift" (Rom. 5:15). That is why we are told, "whoever desires, let him take the water of life freely" (Rev. 22:17). The fact is, it is offensive to try and pay for a free gift, especially when your offense is so great. According to the Bible, our sins killed Jesus. Trying to make up for our sins by good deeds would be like killing a child and then trying to make it up to their parents by doing something. Jesus says, "Come to Me, all you who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest" (Matt. 11:28). Aren't you tired of searching for that perfect gift? Aren't you tired of laboring for the things of this world that never truly satisfy? Wouldn't you like to receive a gift that keeps giving? The Bible says, "Come." Jesus died to pay your penalty. Don't let His death be in vain for you. He appeals, "let him who thirsts come. And whoever desires, let him take the water of life freely" (Rev. 22:17).
